Time to Prepare for Spring Planting

It's a brand new year and with January comes visions of yards teaming with flowers, attractive landscaping, and gardens waiting for vegetables. Whatever your goal is for your outdoor space in 2024, proper planning is the key to developing an environmentally sound yard that will be the envy of your neighbors. Make certain you choose the appropriate plants, locate new or existing vegetation in the right spot, and plan for potential issues. Do you have a slope, unfriendly soils, or a patio to plan around? Get an early start on tackling those challenges by reading the tips below.



Landscaping Tips:

If you have a concrete patio or walkway, remember that rainwater will not infiltrate, but will drain off to existing lawns or vegetation. Unfortunately, these impervious surfaces often result in soggy spots in your yard, because water can't infiltrate naturally. Consider replacing the concrete patio with pavers that will allow precipitation to move into the soil. There are lots of new technologies available so check with your local hardware or lawn and garden store.

Make certain that you carefully plan for soil disturbance. Stabilize any loose soil with a tarp, straw, or compost berm to keep the soil from moving out of your planting site. Disturbed soil can easily move to the street or an adjacent waterway.

Remember that water from the street drains to pipes that discharge to local waterways. Discharging soil or other contaminants is prohibited by the City and by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). Make certain you dig when it's not raining, because working with saturated soil often results in compaction which hampers water infiltration.

When deciding on plants, use native species whenever you can. These plants are suited to Oregon weather conditions and are more likely to survive than plants from other regions. Healthy native plants require less water and provide valuable habitat for wildlife. Check out native plant resources with watershed councils or agencies like the Polk Soil and Water Conservation District www.polkswcd.com

Do your plans include planting trees? Trees are a great addition to urban landscapes not only for their ability to remove airborne pollutants from the air, but they also help block incoming solar radiation. Trees planted along waterways are particularly valuable because of their ability to stabilize stream banks, and shade waterways for temperature-sensitive species such as fish. Check with your local nursery for trees that will do well along waterways. Speaking of waterways, make sure to maintain a buffer strip of unmowed natural vegetation bordering all water bodies to trap excess fertilizers and sediment.

Don't overdo the application of fertilizers and pesticides. Remember to utilize them sparingly, and always follow label directions. Look for environmentally friendly alternatives and local options. More is not better when it comes to chemicals. Proper planning for your spring landscape projects can help avoid unwanted environmental impacts that may be caused by the unintentional discharge of pollutants to the stormwater system or local waterways. Do your part to keep Dallas a clean and healthy City.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & URBAN RENEWAL

Dallas Mill Site Redevelopment Plan gets Underway

In December, City staff and representatives of the property owner led a consultant team, which included lead consultant David Evans & Associates (DEA) and the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT), on a site tour of the former Dallas Mill in south Dallas. Using a state Transportation Growth Management (TGM) grant, the City has retained a DEA and their subcontractors to help design a redevelopment plan for the Dallas Mill Site to include improvements to the transportation systems in this part of the city. The Council's goal is to create new industrial and commercial development opportunities to bring new jobs, investment, and tax revenue to support public safety, parks, and other important General Fund-supported operations. A large and diverse Project Advisory Committee, representing a broad base of community stakeholders, will begin meeting in 2024 and help the consultant, ODOT and the City shape the project. The City will be launching a new project website soon. BUILDING & PLANNING DEPARTMENT

Have you ever thought about pursuing a career that supports the building industry?

There are many career choices and opportunities, such as the ones Dallas staff, which include currently held by our Building Inspectors/Plans Examiners, Building Official. Planner. Permit Technician, and Code Services. There are even more positions and opportunities at the State, County, National, and even International levels. Beyond local opportunities, you may choose to pursue plans examining, code compliance, code writing, project management, disaster mitigation, and so many more careers! Since the education is based on International building codes, certifications can be easily transferred to other states or countries. These positions are needed all over the nation and there is no time like the present to start training for the future!

Many of the current positions throughout the State of Oregon are held by a generation of staff that are nearing retirement, and there are not enough employees in the field or students to meet the future demands. The Oregon Building Codes Division (BCD), Oregon Building Officials Association (OBOA), and International Code Council (ICC) have expressed the need to recruit new people to join the industry. There are many incentives out there such as scholarships, internships, and on-the-job training opportunities. A career in the trade is very obtainable and rewarding!

Our Dallas staff continually obtains Oregon State certifications, which are based on the International Building Code. Chemeketa Community College (CCC) offers a highly respected, nationally recognized, Building Inspection Technology program, which is based at the Chemeketa Brooks campus.

Students can start in the field or the technical programs and continue to grow and obtain certifications throughout their careers. For example, you may be in construction, be an undecided student, or be a permit technician who is ready to advance to an inspector, and that could lead to being a building official, manager, or educator. Many of the courses and exams are online so students out of the area can participate. You can also self-study and directly take the ICC certification exams. You can earn while you learn. The opportunities are limitless, you just need to get started!

Our Building staff belongs to many of the related organizations. Through participation, these organizations work diligently to improve the safety of buildings and planning and help uphold the integrity of the Building Codes for everyone's safety.
