## Parks and Recreation

## John C. Barnard Memorial Park



Last month the City of Dallas was awarded a Land and Water Conservation Fund grant for the construction of John C. Barnard Memorial Park. The grant is in the amount is just over \$570,000 and will pay for half of the cost of constructing the park. The park has been in the planning stages for several years and it's exciting to be able to set a timeline for construction. Groundbreaking for the park will take place in late spring 2024 with construction being completed in early fall 2024.

Named after long-time Dallas resident and City employee, John C. Barnard, the park will be 2.5 acres located at the corner of SE Academy St. and Fir Villa Rd. Once constructed, it will feature play structures, a basketball court, a covered picnic shelter, and a pollinator meadow all connected by leisurely paths and open lawns.

### WHAT'S NEW WITH DALLAS FIRE & EMS?

### **Fall Prevention**

Falls are common and costly, especially among Americans aged 65 and older. However, falls are preventable and do not have to be an inevitable part of aging. Every second of every day, an older adult (age 65+) suffers a fall in the U.S.—making falls the leading cause of injury and injury death in this age group. One out of four older adults will fall each year in the United States, making falls a public health concern, particularly among the aging population.

## 4 Ways To Reduce Fall Risk:

**1. Talk openly with your health care provider** and tell them right away if you are worried about falling.

2. Exercise to improve your balance and strength. Exercise in general can improve your balance and confidence on your feet.



3. Have your eyes and feet checked. Once a year check with your eye doctor. Poor vision can increase your chances of falling. Discuss proper foot wear with your healthcare provider.

#### 4. Make your home safer.

Remove clutter and things you can trip over. Use doublesided tape to keep rugs from slipping. Use non-slip mats in the tub and shower. Improve the lighting so you can see well and wear some sturdy shoes inside and outside the house.

### **Hydrant Makeover**

You might notice the fire hydrants in town are getting a little makeover. Our personnel, along with several community volunteers, have taken on the task of making the hydrants more visible. The chipped white and black paint is being replaced with a vibrant yellow. This is a tedious project and what we need from you is this, if you have a hydrant on your property, be sure you have at least four feet of clearance around the hydrant so that there is no obstruction. Below are some examples of what not to do and what to do. The Dallas City Code about hydrants is referenced below.

#### 5.274 Obstruction Of Fire Hydrants

- 1. No owner of property adjacent to a street upon which is located a fire hydrant shall place or maintain within four feet of the fire hydrant a bush, shrub, tree, or other obstruction.
- 2. [Section 5.274(1) amended by Ordinance. No. 1457, passed March 16, 1992.]
- 3. No person shall place or deposit any material around or near any hydrant, stand pipe, plug, valve, water gate, or other appurtenance comprising a part of the water transmission system of the city to interfere with free access to it.
- 4. The chief of the fire department, a law enforcement officer, or any other city official may proceed to summarily remove any obstruction that prevents access to a hydrant or to the water transmission system if the obstruction presents imminent danger to public safety.
- 5. Violation of this section is a civil infraction.

## Be #WildfireAware

With warmer weather finally in the forecast, tackling those yard projects may be top of mind. Help prevent escaped debris burn by chipping, composting, or recycling yard debris.

In Oregon, escaped debris burns are the number one cause of humansparked fires. Be **#WildfireAware** and prevent a costly outdoor fire. If debris burning is your only option, follow these tips: <u>https://tinyurl.com/3hrus8np</u>



## City Seeks Stormwater Runoff Improvements

Modern cities are designed to provide shelter, roadways on which to travel, walkways on which to recreate, and buildings where we do our business and reside. These conveniences are the fundamental elements for a productive community, but this development has also changed the water cycle of this beautiful spot in the Willamette Valley.

Many of the readers will remember learning about the water cycle in school. In a nutshell, when it rains, water either soaks into the ground, runs off into streams, or is used by plants, and then evaporates back into the air where it condenses and forms rain. When we remove plants, build structures, roads, and another impervious surfaces, we interrupt the natural water cycle.

The stormwater system is a collection of pipes, storm drains, ditches, detention facilities, and other features that are intended to manage the water that is the result of the disturbance in the water cycle! It is often the case that heavy rain events can overwhelm a community's stormwater system. Moreover, high flows from community systems to waterways can mean an increase in the number of pollutants in the stream, degradation of the channel, and disturbance of fish and wildlife habitat.

While the stormwater system plays an important role in helping to manage runoff, these systems are expensive to replace, maintain, and install. Dallas will be developing a program to utilize innovative infiltration techniques to accommodate new development within the community like subdivisions and commercial development.

## **Dallas Business Inventory**





## La Creole Technical Advisory Committee Meeting

The advisory committee has refined the concepts from four down to three which closely align with the needs and preferences of the La Creole community.

We are excited to welcome everyone to the third La Creole Technical Advisory Committee meeting on May 4th. We look forward to hearing your feedback on the refined concepts, as well as your suggestions for commercial and residential components.

The City staff and consultant team launched the La Creole Master Plan Community Hub website. ## **ARPA Projects**

The City of Dallas is scheduled to award nearly \$108,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant funding to nine downtown Dallas building improvement projects. The City Council has authorized \$208,000 over two years in ARPA funds to be used for the downtown Building Improvement Grant Program. \$100,000 has previously been awarded to eight projects in 2022-23.

The nine projects selected to receive funding are:

**1.831/827 Main Street.** Replace roof. Grant amount = \$20,000; total project value = \$80,000.

2. 788 Main Street. Replace windows and door. Grant amount =

13,500; total project value = 40,500.

**3.** 807/811 Main Street/ 131-139 Mill Street. New awnings &

insulation. Grant amount = \$8,430; total project value = \$25,287.

**4. 962** Main Street. Upstairs interior completion. Grant total = \$20,000; total project value = \$60,000.

**5. 680** Main Street. New windows & paint. Grant amount = \$8,465; total project value = \$25,400.

**6. 869** Main Street. New canopy & paint. Grant amount = \$6,945; total project value = \$20,835.

**7. 144 SW Washington Street.** New ADA restrooms. Grant amount = \$6,527.39; total project value = \$19,580.72.

**8. 430** Main Street. Garage door replacement. Grant amount = \$4,125; total project value = \$12,500.

**9. 742** Main Street. ADA restrooms; awning reconstruction. Grant amount = \$20,000; total project value = \$85,000.

## **URDAC** Vacancy

The seven members of this committee are appointed by the Dallas Development Commission - Urban Renewal Agency (URA) and serve four-year terms. The committee meets monthly on the first Tuesday. Generally, the committee recommends urban renewal projects and programs to the URA.

Members of the URDAC are not required to be residents of the City of Dallas. City employees are not eligible to serve on the committee Click here for the committee interest form:

## Economic Development Commission Meeting and Vacancy

Economic Development Commission (DCC 2.905): The commission shall consist of seven members, each serving a four-year term. Members can be City residents or non-residents and are appointed by the City Council upon recommendation of the Mayor and may be removed by the City Council. The committee meets monthly on the fourth Thursday. In general, the commission makes recommendations to the City Council regarding Economic Development matters. A complete list of duties is provided in the Municipal Code.  South Dallas Urban Renewal District Advisory Committee (URA Resolution 2022-02): The committee shall consist of seven members, each serving a four-year term. Members of this committee are the same members as the Economic Development Commission. The committee meets monthly on the fourth Thursday. Generally, the committee recommends urban renewal projects and programs to the URA.

## **Accessory Dwellings**

An accessory dwelling is a second, self-contained dwelling unit on the same property as another house.

Also sometimes known as "backyard cottages," or "ADUs" Dallas allows accessory dwellings in all of our residential zones, subject to certain limitations. This second dwelling may be freestanding, attached to the main house, or above a garage, and can be site-built or premanufactured (but may not be an RV or trailer.)

In Dallas, accessory dwellings are limited in size to 50% of the floor area of the main house, up to a maximum of 800 square feet, and the total footprint of all buildings and paved surfaces on the lot cannot exceed 50% of the total lot area (select areas may have a higher limit). Because they are limited in size, however, accessory dwellings pay only 50% of the development fees of a full-size house, which may make an accessory dwelling more affordable than other options.

## **Basketball Hoop Street Safety**

Just like any other toy or sporting accessory, a bicycle, a ball, or a basketball hoop, put it safely away when you are done actively using it.

Basketball hoops left in the street block parking spaces, prevent the street sweeper from cleaning the curb and are a road hazard. When left in the curb strip or on a sidewalk directly next to the street, they can be a road hazard for taller vehicles. When left on the sidewalk they block ADA use of the sidewalk.



#### 6.126 Encroachments Into Public Right-Of-Way

1. No person shall place, park, leave, deposit, or maintain any structure, barricade, or other obstruction such as building material or merchandise, other than lawfully parking vehicles, on any public right-of-way for more than 72 hours without first obtaining a permit to encroach into public right-of-way at the property owner's risk and subject to the conditions of subsection (3) of this section.

When you are done playing ball, please make sure the hoop is not left on or overhanging the street or blocking the sidewalk. If left in the curb strip, please turn it sideways.

## **FEEMA** Training

This was FEEMA's ICS300/400, Intermediate and Advanced Incident Command, a key training element for staff members who might be involved in coordinating a response to a natural or manmade disaster or emergency.

## New Dispatch System

City and county agencies that are dispatched through WVCC (Willamette Valley Communications Center) are switching to a new Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD) system, which will go live on May 15th. Numerous supervisors and officers went to a "Train the Trainer" class which was a 4-hour class on the new system.

## Intermediate Police Certification

•Officer Courtney Backer has filed the appropriate documents with DPSST to be awarded her Intermediate police certification from DPSST. This should be completed within the next week. Over the course of their career, officers can achieve numerous levels of certification. It begins with a Basic certification, followed by an Intermediate, Advanced, Supervisory, Management, and Executive.




