MEETING MINUTES

Dallas Public Administration Committee Monday, September 25, 2023

- 1 Committee Chair Larry Briggs called the Public Administration Committee meeting to order on
- 2 Monday, September 25, 2023, at 4:03 pm.
- 3 ROLL CALL
- 4 Council Members Present: Councilor Larry Briggs, Councilor Micah Jantz, and Council Presi-
- 5 dent Michael Schilling
- 6 Also Present: City Manager Brian Latta, Assistant City Manager Emily Gagner, City Attorney
- 7 Lane Shetterly, and City Recorder Kim Herring
- 8 APPROVAL OF March 27, 2023 MEETING MINUTES
- 9 It was moved by Councilor Schilling and seconded by Councilor Jantz to approve the minutes as
- presented. The motion passed with a vote of 3-0.

11 DOMESTIC AND FERAL CAT REGULATIONS

- 12 Mr. Latta reviewed the staff report presenting two different issues to address. Fred McGee wrote
- a letter to Mr. Latta complaining about roaming domestic cats. The second issue was the feral cat
- population. There are currently several citizens that trap feral cats so they can get spayed or neu-
- tered and released back to their colony. This is currently done at the trapper's expense as it is no
- longer supported by the Humane Society. The cost to take a cat in to the Humane Society is
- \$50.00 and this includes shots and altering. The committee members came to a consensus to help
- to the state of th
- the trappers find some grant opportunities to help with the cost and write a letter of support
- should grants be found. There are no regulations currently within the City of Dallas with regard
- 20 to roaming domestic cats. The County provides animal control and they enforce their ordinances
- 21 which do not include cats.

22 VEHICLE PARKING CODE AMENDMENTS

- Mr. Latta reviewed the staff report and the recommended updates to the code. There was a con-
- sensus to accept all of the recommendations except for extending the parking limit from 72 hours
- 25 to seven days in residential areas. Councilor Schilling moved and Councilor Jantz seconded to
- refer this item to the City Council for adoption. The motion passed with a vote of 3-0.

27 PORTLAND ORDINANCE AND CITY CODE

- 28 Mr. Latta reviewed the staff report. Oregon SB755 currently preempts any local ordinances with
- 29 regard to drug use. There was a consensus to move this item to the City Council for considera-
- 30 tion. It is recommended by the committee that the Council direct city staff to draft an ordinance
- 31 modeled after the Portland ordinance. If parts of Measure 111 are changed then the local ordi-
- 32 nance would be in effect.

TOPIC: Republic Services Weekly Yard Debris and Recycling Services

RECOMMENDED ACTION:

The Public Administration Committee may:

- Move this topic to the council with a recommendation to approve a change to weekly recycling and yard debris.
- Do nothing, which will retain the every other week pickup of yard debris and recycling

BACKGROUND:

For the past two years, the City and Republic Services have talked about moving the City of Dallas to a weekly pickup schedule for yard debris and recycling services. These services are currently on an every other week schedule.

On October 16, 2023, Republic Services presented to the City Council. They notified the Council that they were in a position with staffing and equipment to provide weekly services for yard debris and recycling, if the Council desired to move in that direction. The Council at that meeting directed the City Attorney to prepare a resolution amending the rates and the schedule for yard debris and recycling servicing. At the November 20, 2023, Council meeting, the City Council considered the resolution and decided that they would like to have further discussion regarding the weekly yard debris and recycling pickup. They requested city staff to work with Republic Services staff to obtain data regarding Dallas customer bin sizes, pricing and other relevant information for the Council to consider in making this decision. The topic of weekly yard debris and recycling has been referred to the Public Administration Committee to review this material and continue the discussion.

Attachment A is material from Republic Services that includes a breakdown of trash bin sizes for Dallas customers, pricing for each bin size, and the saving a customer could receive by downsizing their cart size. Republic Services also provided the 2023 yard debris tonnage report by month, and a listing of benefits from weekly yard debris and recycling services.

SUMMARY TIMELINE:

October 16, 2023 – City Council heard presentation from Republic Services.

November 20, 203 – City Council considered a resolution to increase service rates and amend the pickup schedule for yard debris and recycling to weekly. Council removed the schedule amendment and requested further discussion on this topic.

January 22, 2024 – Public Administration Committee will further discuss the weekly yard debris and recycling services.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The increase cost of weekly services is \$4.30 for a residential customer.

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


