

Delbert Hunter Arboretum Annual Planning Meeting

Members met for the annual planning meeting in January to talk about what we accomplished in 2023 and to plan our budget around goals for the new year. One of our more costly occasional expenses is to have a professional pond service drain and cleanout our pond. The pond is one of our most beloved features and to do a thorough cleanout costs over \$2000. But it must be done every few years to prevent buildup of silt, remove flood debris, and reset the balance of algae growth and sludge accumulation. To budget large projects such as this, we may need to cut back on other large expenses, such as arborist care and trail dressing. As a non-profit organization, the arboretum doesn't receive any other funding than donations. The scope and nature of our projects depend on it.



Other projects involve how to integrate more of our mission with our goal setting. Our mission statement involves..."first to grow, display, and maintain native plants... to provide educational opportunities.... and to promote public interest..."

We have developed a great working relationship with several community partners such as SWCD (Polk Soil and Water Conservation District), and the Dallas Parks and Recreation Department. Together we've had more to offer the community through recreational and learning activities. Many of the Friends of the arboretum have joined in volunteering in SWCD and/or the Parks and Rec projects, as well. There are always volunteer opportunities within our network of ecology related organizations.

Another of our community partners is the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde. We participated in a Camas root dig with them last fall. This winter, many of us volunteered to help SWCD with their winter bare root plant sale. Just for fun, we have already applied for a booth at the Art in the Park festival and we surely hope to see you there on July 28!

What Do Our Volunteers Do?

We have general tasks that we do every week, and other projects arise that require extra time. We clear trails of debris, remove invasive plants and weeds, keep trail edges and around trees string-trimmed, mow grassy areas, prune shrubs and trees according to season, repair damaged items, replace signs, weekly pond maintenance, plant or check on new plantings (including hand watering as needed), regular equipment maintenance, and ensure the sheds and visitor center remains clean.

And of course, we share snack time together.

We also host activities for volunteer groups by prior arrangement, host volunteers days for school students and church groups, give tours the arboretum upon request, and welcome our visitors.

We work every Tuesday from 9 am to noon, March to November. If interested in volunteering, this would be a great time to stop by; or complete the enclosed volunteer form. We've had some interest in weekend volunteer days as well, however this requires another team leader or two. If enough people show interest, we may plan for weekend volunteer work this summer. What Do They Mean By That?

Have you ever puzzled over the 'scientific' names of plants? If the entire world used the same common name for a plant, taxonomic nomenclature might not be as vital, but consider how many different 'bluebells' there are. Lots! Hence, the botanical names give us the most accurate description for a plant.

Botanical names of plants have two parts: the genus name comes first, and is capitalized. The second name (epithet) is descriptive of the plant, and is in lower case letters.

What Bug Is This?

The insects that slept all winter are waking up and getting on with their life cycles in the warmer weather. We recognize the familiar critters that come to inspect our yards and gardens, but occasionally one will come along that we don't know. We found a great website to help identify spiders and insects. This is also a fun learning activity for kids! Check it out! You might even find this green lacewing!
